Christopher S. Knopik is a founding member of KNOPIKVARNERMOORE, a small firm of trial lawyers in Tampa, Florida. Mr. Knopik is experienced in personal injury litigation, medical negligence litigation, product liability litigation, commercial litigation, and maritime litigation in state and federal courts. Although Mr. Knopik's current practice is limited to the representation of plaintiffs in litigated matters, he previously served as national trial counsel for one of the world's largest product manufacturers as well as defense trial counsel for three of the state's largest electric utilities. The KNOPIKVARNERMOORE law firm has been selected as a member of the prestigious International Society of Primerus Law Firms.

Mr. Knopik graduated from the University of Virginia Law School and then served as law clerk to the Honorable William Terrell Hodges, then Chief Federal Judge for the Middle District of Florida. He is admitted to the bars of the United States Supreme Court, United States Court of Appeals for the Eleventh Circuit, the United States District Court for the Middle and Southern Districts of Florida and the bar of the State of Florida.
